# "Laudate Deum": the Pope's cry for a response to the climate crisis

Pope Francis has published an Apostolic Exhortation building on his 2015 encyclical. We're not reacting enough, he says, we're close to breaking point. He criticises climate change deniers, saying that the human origin of global warming is now beyond doubt. And he describes how care for our common home flows from the Christian faith.

"Praise God' is the title of this letter. For when human beings claim to take God's place, they become their own worst enemies."

That's how Pope Francis ends his <u>new Apostolic Exhortation</u>, published on the 4th October, the Feast of St Francis of Assisi. It's a text in continuity with his 2015 encyclical *Laudato si'*, which is broader in scope. In six chapters and 73 paragraphs, the Successor of Peter tries to clarify and bring to completion that previous text on integral ecology, while at the same time sounding an alarm, and a call for co-responsibility, in the face of the climate emergency.

In particular, the Exhortation looks ahead to COP28, which will be held in Dubai between the end of November and beginning of December.

The Holy Father writes: "With the passage of time, I have realized that our responses have not been adequate, while the world in which we live is collapsing and may be nearing the breaking point. In addition to this possibility, it is indubitable that the impact of climate change will increasingly prejudice the lives and families of many persons" (2). It's "one of the principal challenges facing society and the global community" and "the effects of climate change are borne by the most vulnerable people, whether at home or around the world" (3).

In St Brigid's Parish Centre, on 9<sup>th</sup> November next, beginning at 7.30pm, Fr Timothy Barlett will give a presentation on Pope Francis' letter, Laudate Deum. Everyone welcome to attend.

# Journeying to the Light by John Mann

In his reflection for the fourth day of Advent, John writes, "In taking my violin out of its case and turning up a piece of music, I look for something that will get my fingers and bowing arm moving but has a tune as well." Just a few weeks ago, we remembered the tenth anniversary of the death of Seamus Heaney. When asked about their favourite Heaney poem many will answer "Digging", but my favourite is "The Given Note". It concerns a "fiddler" – and begins:

"On the most westerly Blasket In a dry-stone hut He got this air out of the night".

While I realise John Mann is unlikely to describe himself as a "fiddler", nevertheless, that which Heaney describes in his poem, John has achieved in his book, "Journeying to the light" — Bishop Brendan Leahy rightly comments in his introduction, "There are many gems in this text".

Heaney, in his poem, says of the fiddler:

"For he had gone alone into the island And brought back the whole thing. The house throbbed like his full violin".

John has journeyed out to those islands, situated in our liturgical year, named Advent and Christmastide, "And brought back the whole thing", those wonderful rhymes, and music, of Emmanuel. The poem concludes:

"It comes off the bow gravely, Rephrases itself into the air". In this book, John, has for us, "gently but clearly" (B. Leahy, Introduction), rephrased Advent and Christmastide, that, just as Heaney noted, "The house throbbed like his full violin", our hearts might "throb" with wonder and joy at God's amazing plan, "gently but clearly" revealed in the scriptures of the season. Those who truly engage with the reflections in John's book will find them "transformative".

John makes reference to that great spiritual master of the mid-twentieth century, Thomas Merton. Commenting on the Advent season, Merton, wrote, "the Church in preparing us for the birth of a "great prophet", a Saviour and King of Peace, has in mind more than seasonal cheer. In Advent we celebrate the coming and indeed the presence of Christ in our world" (cf Meditations on the Liturgy, Mowbrays, p42). "The Word become flesh", in person, seeks to enter into conversation with everyone.

A very attractive feature of "Journeying to the Light" is its conversational tone – John talks to us about himself and his experiences, about his family and ministry; about people encountered, especially those encountered in the scripture ascribed to Advent and Christmastide; he shares insightful observations concerning the realities of the modern world, remining us that we "are not mere bystanders" in a tired and sinful world (cf Day Six, p16). At times we are invited to be like Isaiah, and to feel the roughness of the ground, its unevenness, and its gradients (cf Day 10, p 26), then, in other moments, in quiet contemplative prayer, to take flight with the Johannine eagle (cf Day 11, p28).

These meditations are as series of conversations, best read slowly, and in doing so we will find ourselves joining in the conversation. That great medieval saint, Catherine of Siena, claimed that there was no greater joy that talking with one's friends about God. This book, "Journeying to the Light", allows us to share in such a joy. John, thank-you for this joy!

In the reflection for Day 1, the First Sunday of Advent, John begins, "I launch us into our journey through Advent....". Justice can only be done to these reflections by actually making the journey. We couldn't do better than be launched this Advent with "Journeying to the Light" as our "navigational chart"! (By-the-way, Advent begins this year on 3<sup>rd</sup> December, therefore, we have adequate time to acquire a copy!)

John, thank you for inviting me to say these few words at the launch your book; thank you for, in the words of St Paul, your "concern for all the churches (Phil.2:1-2); thank you for your friendship.
