

CHOOSING THE READINGS

The readings are a central part of your loved one's funeral Mass. You may choose one Old Testament and/or one New Testament reading before the Gospel reading. The Responsorial Psalm comes after the first reading.

The following is a helpful guide but you are free to choose readings from scripture and a psalm other than those contained in this booklet. Your priest will help guide you on the choice of readings.

The location of each reading and psalm in the Lectionary is noted below. The Lectionary is the official book of readings used at Mass.

FIRST READINGS

A. FROM THE OLD TESTAMENT

FIRST READING 1 (LECTIONARY OLD TESTAMENT 1)

A reading from the book of Job [19:1.23–27] Job said: 'Ah, would that these words of mine were written down.

inscribed on some monument with iron chisel and engraving tool, cut into the rock for ever.

This I know: that my Avenger lives, and he, the Last, will take his stand on earth. After my awaking, he will set me close to him, and from my flesh I shall look on God. He whom I shall see will take my part: these eyes will gaze on him and find him not aloof.

FIRST READING 2 (LECTIONARY OLD TESTAMENT 2B)

A reading from the book of Wisdom [3:1-6.9]

The souls of the virtuous are in the hands of God,

no torment shall ever touch them. In the eyes of the unwise, they did appear to die,

their going looked like a disaster, their leaving us, like annihilation;

but they are in peace.

If they experienced punishment as men see it, their hope was rich with immortality;

slight was their affliction, great will their blessing be.

God has put them to the test and proved them worthy to be with him; he has tested them like gold in a furnace, and accepted them as a holocaust. They who trust in him will understand the truth,

those who are faithful will live with him in love; for grace and mercy await those he has chosen.

FIRST READING 3 (LECTIONARY OLD TESTAMENT 3)

A reading from the book of Wisdom [4:7-15]

The virtuous man, though he died before his time, will find rest.

Length of days is not what makes age honourable,

nor number of years the true measure of life; understanding, this is a person's grey hairs, untarnished life, this is ripe old age. He has sought to please God, so God has

as he was living among sinners, he has been taken up.

He has been carried off so that evil may not warp his understanding

or treachery seduce his soul;

for the fascination of evil throws good things into the shade,

FIRST READING 4 (LECTIONARY OLD TESTAMENT 4)

A reading from the prophet Isaiah [25:6-9]

On this mountain, the Lord of hosts will prepare for all peoples a banquet of rich food. On this mountain he will remove the mourning veil covering all peoples, and the shroud enwrapping all nations, he will destroy Death for ever. The Lord will wipe away the tears from every cheek; he will take away his people's shame everywhere on earth, for the Lord has said so. That day, it will be said: See, this is our God in whom we hoped for salvation; the Lord is the one in whom we hoped. We exult and we rejoice

that he has saved us. The word of the Lord.

FIRST READING 5 (LECTIONARY OLD TESTAMENT 5)

A reading from the book of Lamentations [3:17-26]

My soul is shut out from peace; I have forgotten happiness. And now I say, 'My strength is gone, that hope which came from the Lord'. Brooding on my anguish and affliction is gall and wormwood. My spirit ponders it continually and sinks within me. This is what I shall tell my heart, and so recover hope:

the favours of the Lord are not all past, his kindnesses are not exhausted; every morning they are renewed; great is his faithfulness. 'My portion is the Lord' says my soul 'and so I will hope in him.' The Lord is good to those who trust him, to the soul that searches for him. It is good to wait in silence for the Lord to save.

FIRST READING 6 (LECTIONARY OLD TESTAMENT 7)

A reading from the second book of Maccabees [12:43-45]

Judas, the leader of the Jews, took a collection from the people individually, amounting to nearly two thousand drachmae, and sent it to Jerusalem to have a sacrifice for sin offered, an altogether fine and noble action, in which he took full account of the resurrection. For if he had not expected the fallen to rise again it would have been superfluous and foolish to pray for the dead, whereas if he had in view the splendid recompense reserved for those who make a pious end, the thought was holy and devout. This was why he had this atonement sacrifice offered for the dead, so that they might be released from their sin.

FIRST READING 7 (NOT IN LECTIONARY)

A reading from the Book of Tobit [4: 1-5, 15-17, 20]

Tobit thought: 'I have come to the point of praying for death; I should do well to call my son Tobias and talk to him'. He summoned his son Tobias and told him: `When I die, give me an honourable burial. Honour your mother, and never abandon her all the days of your life. Do all that she wants, and give her no reason for sorrow. Remember, my child, all the risks she ran for your sake when you were in her womb. And when she dies, bury her at my side in the same grave'.

'My child, be faithful to the Lord all your days. Never entertain the will to sin or to transgress his laws. Do good works all the days of your

life, never follow ways that are not right; for if you act in truthfulness, you will be successful in all your actions, as all men are if they practice what is right...'

'Be careful, my child, in all you do, welldisciplined in all your behaviour. Do to no one what you would not want done to you. Do not drink wine to the point of drunkenness; do not let excess be your travelling companion. Give your bread to those who are hungry, and your clothes to those who are naked. Whatever you own in plenty, devote a proportion to almsgiving; and when you give alms, do not do it grudgingly'... So now, my child, remember these precepts and never let them fade from your heart.'

Tobias then answered his father Tobit, 'Father,' he said, 'I will do everything you have told me.'

B. FROM THE NEW TESTAMENT

FIRST READING 8 (LECTIONARY NEW **TESTAMENT FIRST READINGS 2)**

A reading from the book of Revelation [14:13]

I, John, heard a voice from heaven say to me, 'Write down: happy are those who die in the Lord! Happy indeed, the Spirit says; now they can rest for ever after their work, since their good deeds go with them.'

The word of the Lord.

FIRST READING 9 (LECTIONARY NEW TESTAMENT FIRST READINGS 3)

A reading from the book of Revelation [20:11-21:1]

I, John, saw a great white throne and the One who was sitting on it. In his presence, earth and sky vanished, leaving no trace. I saw the dead, both great and small, standing in front of his throne, while the book of life was opened, and other books opened which were the record of what they had done in their lives, by which the dead were judged.

The sea gave up all the dead who were in it; Death and Hades were emptied of the dead that were in them; and every one was judged according to the way in which he had lived. Then Death and Hades were thrown into the burning lake. This burning lake is the second death; and anybody whose name could not be found written in the book of life was thrown into the burning lake.

Then I saw a new heaven and a new earth; the first heaven and the first earth had disappeared now, and there was no longer any sea.

FIRST READING 10 (LECTIONARY NEW **TESTAMENT FIRST READINGS 4)**

A reading from the book of Revelation [21:1-7]

I, John, saw a new heaven and a new earth; the first heaven and the first earth had disappeared now, and there was no longer any sea. I saw the holy city, and the new Jerusalem, coming down from God out of heaven, as beautiful as a bride all dressed for her husband. Then I heard a loud voice call from the throne, 'You see the city? Here God lives among men. He will make his home among them: they shall be his people, and he will be their God; his name is God-with-them. He will wipe away all tears from their eyes; there will be no more death, and no more mourning or sadness. The world of the past has gone.'

Then the One sitting on the throne spoke: 'Now I am making the whole of creation new,' he said. 'I will give water from the well of life free to anybody who is thirsty; it is the rightful inheritance of the one who proves victorious, and I will be his God and he a son to me.'

RESPONSORIAL PSALM 1 [PSALM 26] (LECTIONARY AFTER OLD TESTAMENT FIRST READING 1)

Response: The Lord is my light and my help.

The Lord is my light and my help; whom shall I fear?
The Lord is the stronghold of my life; before whom shall I shrink? R.

There is one thing I ask of the Lord, for this I long, to live in the house of the Lord all the days of my life, to savour the sweetness of the Lord, to behold His temple. R.

O Lord, hear my voice when I call; have mercy and answer. It is your face, O Lord, that I seek; hide not your face. R.

I am sure I shall see the Lord's goodness in the land of the living. Hope in him, hold firm and take heart. Hope in the Lord. R.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM 2 [PSALM 114] (LECTIONARY AFTER OLD TESTAMENT FIRST READING 2)

Response:

I will walk in the presence of the Lord, in the land of the living

O precious in the eyes of the Lord is the death of his faithful. Your servant, Lord, your servant am I; you have loosened my bonds. R RESPONSORIAL PSALM 3 [PSALM 22] (LECTIONARY AFTER OLD TESTAMENT FIRST READING 4)

Response:

The Lord is my shepherd; There is nothing I shall want.

The Lord in my shepherd; there is nothing I shall want. Fresh and green are the pastures where he gives me repose. Near restful waters he leads me, to revive my drooping spirit. R.

He guides me along the right path; he is true to his name. If I should walk in the valley of darkness no evil would I fear. You are there with your crook and your staff; with these you give me comfort. R.

You have prepared a banquet for me in the sight of my foes.

My head you have anointed with oil; my cup is overflowing. R.

Surely goodness and kindness shall follow me all the days of my life.
In the Lord's own house shall I dwell for ever and ever. R.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM 4 [PSALM 24] (LECTIONARY AFTER OLD TESTAMENT FIRST READING 5)

Response:

Those who hope in you, Lord, shall not be disappointed.

Remember your mercy, Lord, and the love you have shown from of old. In your love remember me, because of your goodness, O Lord. R

Relieve the anguish of my heart and set me free from my distress. See my affliction and my toil and take all my sins away. R Preserve my life and rescue me. Do not disappoint me, you are my refuge. May innocence and uprightness protect me: for my hope is in you, O Lord. R

RESPONSORIAL PSALM 5 [PSALM 41] (LECTIONARY AFTER OLD TESTAMENT FIRST READING 6)

Response: My soul is thirsting for God,

Like a deer that yearns for running streams, so my soul is yearning for you, my God. R.

the God of my life.

My soul is thirsting for God, the God of my life; when can I enter and see the face of God? R.

These things will I remember as I pour out my soul: how I would lead the rejoicing crowd into the house of God, amid cries of gladness and thanksgiving, the throng wild with joy. R.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM 6 [PSALM 102] (LECTIONARY AFTER OLD TESTAMENT FIRST READING 7)

Response: The Lord is compassion and love.

The Lord is compassion and love, slow to anger and rich in mercy. He does not treat us according to our sins nor repay us according to our faults. R.

As a father has compassion on his children, the Lord has pity of those who fear him; for he knows of what we are made, he remembers that we are dust. R.

As for man, his days are like grass; he flowers like the flower of the field; the wind blows and he is gone and his place never sees him again. R.

But the love of the Lord is everlasting upon those who fear him; he justice reaches out to children's children when they keep his covenant in truth. R.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM 7 [PSALM 23] (NOT IN LECTIONARY)

Response:

The Lord's is the earth and its fullness.

The Lord's is the earth and its fullness, the world and all its peoples. It is he who set it on the seas; on the waters he made it firm. R.

Who shall climb the mountain of the Lord? Who shall stand in his holy place? Those with clean hands and pure heart, who desire not worthless things. R.

They shall receive blessings from the Lord and reward from the God who saves them. Such are the people who seek him, seek the face of the God of Jacob. R.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM 8 [PSALM 83] (NOT IN LECTIONARY)

Response:

My soul is longing for the courts of the Lord.

The sparrow finds herself a home and the swallow a nest for her brood; she lays her young by your altars, Lord of hosts, my king and my God. R.

They are happy, who dwell in your house, for ever singing your praise.
They are happy, whose strength is in you, in whose hearts are the roads to Sion. R.

As they go through the Bitter Valley they make it a place of springs. They walk with ever growing strength, they will see the God of gods in Sion. R.

For the Lord God is a rampart, a shield; he will give us his favour and glory. The Lord will not refuse any good to those who walk without blame. R.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM 9 [PSALM 129] (LECTIONARY AFTER NEW TESTAMENT FIRST READING 2)

Response: Out of the depths I cry to you, O Lord. Lord.

Out of the depths I cry to you, O Lord, Lord, hear my voice. O let your ears be attentive to the voice of my pleading. R.

If you, O Lord, should mark our guilt, Lord, who would survive?

But with you is found forgiveness: for this we revere you. R.

My soul is waiting for the Lord, I count on his work. My soul is longing for the Lord more than watchman for daybreak. R.

Because with the Lord there is mercy and fullness of redemption, Israel indeed he will redeem from all its iniquity. R.

SECOND READINGS

FROM THE NEW TESTAMENT

SECOND READING 1 (LECTIONARY, FIRST READING EASTER SEASON 1)

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles [10:34-43]

Peter addressed Cornelius and his household: 'The truth I have now come to realise,' he said, 'is that God does not have favourites, but that anybody of any nationality who fears God and does what is right is acceptable to him. 'It is true, God sent his word to the people of Israel, and it was to them that the good news of peace was brought by Jesus Christ - but Jesus Christ is Lord of all people. You must have heard about the recent happenings in Judaea; about Jesus of Nazareth and how he began in Galilee, after John had been preaching baptism. God had anointed him with the Holy Spirit and with power, and because God was with him, Jesus went about doing good and curing all who had fallen into the power of the devil. Now I, and those with me, can witness to everything he did throughout the countryside of Judaea and in Jerusalem itself: and also to the fact that they killed him by hanging him on a tree, yet three days afterwards God raised him to life and allowed him to be seen, not by the whole people but only by certain witnesses God had chosen beforehand. Now we are those witnesses - we have eaten and drunk with him after his resurrection from the dead - and he has ordered us to proclaim

this to his people and to tell them that God has appointed him to judge everyone alive or dead. It is to him that all the prophets bear this witness: that all who believe in Jesus will have their sins forgiven through his name.'

The word of the Lord.

SECOND READING 2 (LECTIONARY NEW TESTAMENT 1)

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Romans [5:5-11]

Hope is not deceptive, because the love of God has been poured into our hearts by the Holy Spirit which has been given us. We were still helpless when at his appointed moment Christ died for sinful men. It is not easy to die even for a good man - though of course for someone really worthy, a man might be prepared to die - but what proves that God loves us is that Christ died for us while we were still sinners. Having died to make us righteous, is it likely that he would now fail to save us from God's anger? When we were reconciled to God by the death of his Son, we were still enemies; now that we have been reconciled, surely we may count on being saved by the life of his Son? Not merely because we have been reconciled but because we are filled with joyful trust in God, through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have already gained our reconciliation.

The word of the Lord.

SECOND READING 3 (LECTIONARY NEW TESTAMENT 2)

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Romans [5:17-21]

If it is certain that death reigned over everyone as the consequence of one man's fall, it is even more certain that one man, Jesus Christ, will cause everyone to reign in life who receives the free gift that he does not deserve, of being made righteous. Again, as one man's fall brought condemnation on everyone, so that good act of one man brings everyone life and makes them justified. As by one man's disobedience many were made sinners, so by one man's obedience many will be made righteous. When law came, it was to multiply the opportunities of falling, but however great the number of sins committed, grace was even greater; and so, just as sin reigned wherever there was death, so grace will reign to bring eternal life thanks to the righteousness that comes through Jesus Christ our Lord.

SECOND READING 4 (LECTIONARY NEW TESTAMENT 3)

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Romans [6:3-4, 8-9]

When we were baptised in Christ Jesus we were baptised in his death; in other words, when we were baptised we went into the tomb with him and joined him in death, so that as Christ was raised from the dead by the Father's glory, we too might live a new life. We believe that having died with Christ we shall return to life with him: Christ, as we know, having been raised from the dead will never die again. Death has no power over him any more.

The word of the Lord.

SECOND READING 5 (LECTIONARY NEW TESTAMENT 4)

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Romans [8:14–23]

Everyone moved by the Spirit is a child of God. The spirit you received is not the spirit of slaves bringing fear into our lives again; it is the spirit of children, and it makes us cry

out, 'Abba, Father!' The Spirit himself and our spirit bear united witness that we are children of God. And if we are children we are heirs as well: heirs of God and coheirs with Christ, sharing his sufferings so as to share his glory.

I think that what we suffer in this life can never be compared to the glory, as yet unrevealed, which is waiting for us. The whole creation is eagerly waiting for God to reveal his children. It was not for any fault on the part of creation that it was made unable to attain its purpose, it was made so by God; but creation still retains the hope of being freed, like us, from its slavery to decadence, to enjoy the same freedom and glory as the children of God. From the beginning till now the entire creation, as we know, has been groaning in one great act of giving birth; and not only creation, but all of us who possess the firstfruits of the Spirit, we too groan inwardly as we wait for our bodies to be set free.

SECOND READING 6 (LECTIONARY NEW TESTAMENT 5)

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Romans [8:31–35.37–39]

With God on our side who can be against us? Since God did not spare his own Son, but gave him up to benefit us all, we may be certain, after such a gift, that he will not refuse us anything he can give. Could anyone accuse those that God has chosen? When God acquits, could anyone condemn? Could Christ Jesus? No! He not only died for us – he rose from the dead, and there at God's right hand he stands and pleads for us.

Nothing therefore can come between us and

Nothing therefore can come between us and the love of Christ, even if we are troubled or worried, or being persecuted, or lacking food or clothes, or being threatened or even attacked. These are the trials through which we triumph, by the power of him who loved us. For I am certain of this: neither death nor life, no angel, no prince, nothing that exists, nothing still to come, not any power, or height or depth, nor any created thing, can ever come between us and the love of God made visible in Christ Jesus our Lord.

SECOND READING 7 (LECTIONARY NEW TESTAMENT 6)

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Romans [14:7-12]

The life and death of each of us has its influence on others; if we live, we live for the Lord; and if we die, we die for the Lord, so that alive or dead we belong to the Lord. This explains why Christ both died and came to life, it was so that he might be Lord both of the dead and of the living. We shall all have to stand before the judgement seat of God; as scripture says: By my life – it is the Lord who speaks – every knee shall bend before me, and every tongue shall praise God. It is to God, therefore, that each of us must give an account of himself.

The word of the Lord.

SECOND READING 8 (LECTIONARY NEW TESTAMENT 7)

A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Corinthians [15:20–23]

Christ has been raised from the dead, the first-fruits of all who have fallen asleep. Death came through one man and in the same way the resurrection of the dead has come through one man. Just as all die in Adam, so all will be brought to life in Christ; but all of them in their proper order; Christ as the first-fruits and then, after the coming of Christ, those who belong to him.

The word of the Lord.

SECOND READING 9 (LECTIONARY NEW TESTAMENT 8)

A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Corinthians [15:51–57]

I will tell you something that has been secret; that we are not all going to die, but we shall all be changed. This will be instantaneous, in the twinkling of an eye, when the last trumpet sounds. It will sound, and the dead will be raised, imperishable, and we shall be changed as well, because our present perishable nature must put on imperishability and this mortal nature must put on immortality.

When this perishable nature has put on imperishability, and when this mortal nature has put on immortality, then the words of scripture will come true: Death is swallowed up in victory. Death, where is your victory? Death, where is your sting? Now the sting of death is sin, and sin gets its power from the Law. So let us thank God for giving us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ.

SECOND READING 10 (LECTIONARY NEW TESTAMENT 10)

A reading from the second letter of St Paul to the Corinthians [5:1.6–10]

We know that when the tent that we live in on earth is folded up, there is a house built by God for us, an everlasting home not made by human hands, in the heavens.

We are always full of confidence, then, when we remember that to live in the body means to be exiled from the Lord, going as we do by faith and not by sight – we are full of confidence, I say, and actually want to be exiled from the body and make our home with the Lord. Whether we are living in the body or exiled from it, we are intent on pleasing him. For all the truth about us will be brought out in the law court of Christ, and each of us will get what he deserves for the things he did in the body, good or bad.

SECOND READING 11 (LECTIONARY NEW TESTAMENT 11)

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Philippians [3:20-21]

For us, our homeland is in heaven, and from heaven comes the saviour we are waiting for, the Lord Jesus Christ, and he will transfigure these wretched bodies of ours into copies of his glorious body. He will do that by the same power with which he can subdue the whole universe.

The word of the Lord.

SECOND READING 12 (LECTIONARY NEW TESTAMENT 12)

A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Thessalonians [4:13–18]

We want you to be quite certain, brothers, about those who have died, to make sure that you do not grieve about them, like the other people who have no hope. We believe that Jesus died and rose again, and that it will be the same for those who have died in Jesus: God will bring them with him. We can tell you this from the Lord's own teaching, that any of us who are left alive until the Lord's coming will not have any advantage over those who have died. At the trumpet of God, the voice of the archangel will call out the command and the Lord himself will come down from heaven; those who have died in Christ will be the first to rise, and then those of us who are still alive will be taken up in the clouds, together with them, to meet the Lord in the air. So we shall stay with the Lord for ever. With such thoughts as these you should comfort one another.

SECOND READING 13 (LECTIONARY NEW TESTAMENT 13)

A reading from the second letter of St Paul to Timothy [2:8-13]

Remember the Good News that I carry, Jesus Christ risen from the dead, sprung from the race of David; it is on account of this that I have my own hardships to bear, even to being chained like a criminal – but they cannot chain up God's news. So I bear it all for the sake of those who are chosen so that in the end they may have the salvation that is in Christ Jesus and the eternal glory that comes with it.

Here is a saying that you can rely on: If we have died with him, then we shall live with him.

If we hold firm, then we shall reign with him. If we disown him, then he will disown us. We may be unfaithful, but he is always faithful,

for he cannot disown his own self.

The word of the Lord.

SECOND READING 14 (NOT IN LECTIONARY)

A reading from the second letter of St Paul to Timothy [4:6-8]

As for me, my life is already being poured away as libation, and the time has come for me to be gone. I have fought the good fight to the end; I have run the race to the finish; I have kept the faith; all there is to come now is the crown of righteousness reserved for me, which the Lord, the righteous judge, will give me on that Day; and not only to me but to all those who have longed for his Appearing.

SECOND READING 15 (LECTIONARY NEW TESTAMENT 14)

A reading from the first letter of St John [3:1–2]

Think of the love that the Father has lavished on us.

by letting us be called God's children; and that is what we are.

Because the world refused to acknowledge him

therefore it does not acknowledge us. My dear people, we are already the children of God

but what we are to be in the future has not yet been revealed:

all we know is, that when it is revealed we shall be like him

because we shall see him as he really is.

SECOND READING 16 (LECTIONARY NEW TESTAMENT 15)

A reading from the first letter of St John [3:14-16]

We have passed out of death and into life, and of this we can be sure because we love one another.

If you refuse to love, you must remain dead; to hate your brother is to be a murderer, and murderers, as you know, do not have eternal life in them.

This has taught us love — that he gave up his life for us; and we, too, ought to give up our lives for our brothers and sisters.

The word of the Lord.

SECOND READING 17 (NOT IN LECTIONARY)

A reading from the first letter of St John [4:7-12.17]

My dear people,

let us love one another since love comes from God and everyone who loves is begotten by God and know God.

Anyone who fails to love can never have known God, because God is love.

God's love for us was revealed when God sent into the world his only Son so that we could have life through him; this is the love I mean;

not our love for God.

but God's love for us when he sent his Son to be the sacrifice that takes our sins away. My dear people, since God has loved us so much, we too should love one another. No one has ever seen God;

but as long as we love one another. No one has ever seen God; but will live in us

and his love will be complete in us. Love will come to its perfection in us

when we can face the day of Judgement without fear.

GOSPEL READINGS

GOSPEL READING 1 (LECTIONARY GOSPEL 1)

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew [5:1–12]

Seeing the crowds, Jesus went up the hill. There he sat down and was joined by his disciples. Then he began to speak. This is what he taught them:

'How happy are the poor in spirit; theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

Happy the gentle:

they shall have the earth for their heritage.

Happy those who mourn;

they shall be comforted. Happy those who hunger and thirst for what

is right: they shall be satisfied.

Happy the merciful:

they shall have mercy shown them.

Happy the pure in heart:

they shall see God.

Happy the peacemakers:

they shall be called children of God.

Happy those who are persecuted in the cause of right:

theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

'Happy are you when people abuse you and persecute you and speak all kinds of calumny against you on my account. Rejoice and be glad, for your reward will be great in heaven.'

GOSPEL READING 2 (LECTIONARY GOSPEL 2)

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew [11:25-30]

Jesus exclaimed, 'I bless you, Father, Lord of heaven and of earth, for hiding these things from the learned and the clever and revealing them to mere children. Yes, Father, for that is what it pleased you to do. Everything has been entrusted to me by my Father; and no one knows the Son except the Father, just as no one knows the Father except the Son and those to whom the Son chooses to reveal him. 'Come to me, all you who labour and are overburdened, and I will give you rest. Shoulder my yoke and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. Yes, my yoke is easy and my burden light.'

GOSPEL READING 3 (LECTIONARY GOSPEL 3)

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew [25:1-13]

Jesus spoke this parable to his disciples: 'The kingdom of heaven will be like this: Ten bridesmaids took their lamps and went to meet the bridegroom. Five of them were foolish and five were sensible: the foolish ones did take their lamps, but they brought

no oil, whereas the sensible ones took flasks of oil as well as their lamps. The bridegroom was late and they all grew drowsy and fell asleep. But at midnight there was a cry. "The bridegroom is here! Go out and meet him." At this, all those bridesmaids woke up and trimmed their lamps, and the foolish ones said to the sensible ones, "Give us some of your oil: our lamps are going out." But they replied, "There may not be enough for us and for you; you had better go to those who sell it and buy some for yourselves." They had gone off to buy it when the bridegroom arrived. Those who were ready went in with him to the wedding hall and the door was closed. The other bridesmaids arrived later. "Lord, Lord," they said, "open the door for us." But he replied, "I tell you solemnly, I do not know you." So stay awake, because you do not know either the day or the hour.'

GOSPEL READING 4 (LECTIONARY GOSPEL 4)

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew[25:31–40]

Jesus said to his disciples; 'When the Son of Man comes in his glory, escorted by all the angels, then he will take his seat on his throne of glory. All the nations will be assembled before him and he will separate men one from another as the shepherd separates sheep from goats. He will place the sheep on his right hand and the goats on his left. Then the King will say to those on his right hand, "Come, you whom my Father has blessed, take for your heritage the kingdom prepared for you since the foundation of the world. For I was hungry and you gave me food: I was thirsty and you gave me drink; I was a stranger and you made me welcome; naked and you clothed me, sick and you visited me, in prison and you came to see me." Then the virtuous will say to him in reply, "Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you; or thirsty and give you drink? When did we see you a stranger and make you welcome; naked and clothe you; sick or in prison and go to see you?" And the King will answer, "I tell you solemnly, in so far as you did this to one of the least of these brothers of mine, you did it to me."

GOSPEL READING 5 (LECTIONARY GOSPEL 5)

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark [15:33-39]

When the sixth hour came there was darkness over the whole land until the ninth hour. And at the ninth hour Jesus cried out in a loud voice, 'Eloi, Eloi, lama sabachthani?' which means, 'My God, my God, why have you deserted me?' When some of those who stood by heard this, they said, 'Listen, he is calling on Elijah.' Someone ran and soaked a sponge in vinegar and, putting it on a reed, gave it to him to drink saying, 'Wait and see if Elijah will come to take him down.' But Jesus gave a loud cry and breathed his last. And the veil of the Temple was torn in two from top to bottom. The centurion, who was standing in front of him, had seen how he had died and he said, 'In truth this man was a son of God.'

GOSPEL READING 6 (LECTIONARY GOSPEL 6)

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke [7:11–17]

Jesus went to a town called Nain, accompanied by his disciples and a great number of people. When he was near the gate of the town it happened that a dead man was being carried out for burial, the only son of his mother, and she was a widow. And a considerable number of the townspeople were with her. When the Lord saw her he felt sorry for her. 'Do not cry,' he said. Then he went up and put his hand on the bier and the bearers stood still, and he said, 'Young man, I tell you to get up'. And the dead man sat up and began to talk, and Jesus gave him to his mother. Everyone was filled with awe and praised God saying, 'A great prophet has appeared among us; God has visited his people. And this opinion of him spread throughout Judaea and all over the countryside.

GOSPEL READING 7 (LECTIONARY GOSPEL 7)

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke [12:35–40]

Jesus said to his disciples: 'See that you are dressed for action and have your lamps lit. Be like men waiting for their master to return from the wedding feast, ready to open the door as soon as he comes and knocks. Happy those servants whom the master finds awake when he comes. I tell you solemnly, he will put on an apron, sit them down at table and wait on them. It may be in the second watch he comes, or in the third, but happy those servants if he finds them ready. You may be guite sure of this, that if the householder had known at what hour the burglar would come, he would not have let anyone break through the wall of his house. You too must stand ready, because the Son of Man is coming at an hour you do not expect.'

GOSPEL READING 8 (LECTIONARY GOSPEL 8)

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke [23:33.39-43]

When the soldiers reached the place called The Skull, they crucified Jesus there and the two criminals also, one on the right, the other on the left.

One of the criminals hanging there abused him. 'Are you not the Christ?' he said. 'Save yourself and us as well.' But the other spoke up and rebuked him. 'Have you no fear of God at all?' he said. 'You got the same sentence as he did, but in our case we deserved it: we are paying for what we did. But this man has done nothing wrong. Jesus,' he said, 'remember me when you come into your kingdom.' 'Indeed, I promise you,' he replied, 'today you will be with me in paradise.'

GOSPEL READING 9 (LECTIONARY GOSPEL 9)

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke [23:44–46. 50. 52–53. 24:1–6]

It was about the sixth hour and, with the sun eclipsed, a darkness came over the whole

land until the ninth hour. The veil of the Temple was torn right down the middle; and when Jesus had cried out in a loud voice, he said, 'Father, into your hands I commit my spirit'. With these words he breathed his last. Then a member of the council arrived, an upright and virtuous man named Joseph. This man went to Pilate and asked for the body of Jesus. He then took it down, wrapped it in a shroud and put him in a tomb which was hewn in stone in which no one had yet been laid.

On the first day of the week, at the first sign of dawn, the women went to the tomb with the spices they had prepared. They found that the stone had been rolled away from the tomb, but on entering discovered that the body of the Lord Jesus was not there. As they stood there not knowing what to think, two men in brilliant clothes suddenly appeared at their side. Terrified, the women lowered their eyes. But the two men said to them, 'Why look among the dead for someone who is alive? He is not here, he has risen.'

GOSPEL READING 10 (LECTIONARY GOSPEL 10)

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke [24:13–16. 28-35]

On the first day of the week, two of the disciples were on their way to a village called Emmaus, seven miles from Jerusalem, and they were talking together about all that had happened. Now as they talked this over, Jesus himself came up and walked by their side; but something prevented them from recognising him.

When they drew near to the village to which they were going, he made as if to go on; but they pressed him to stay with them. 'It is nearly evening,' they said, 'and the day is almost over.' So he went in to stay with them. Now while he was with them at table, he took the bread and said the blessing; then he broke it and handed it to them. And their eyes were opened and they recognised him; but he had vanished from their sight. Then they said to each other, 'Did not our hearts burn within us as he talked to us on the road and explained the scriptures to us?'

They set out that instant and returned to Jerusalem. There they found the Eleven assembled together with their companions, who said to them, 'Yes, it is true. The Lord has risen and has appeared to Simon.' Then they told their story of what had happened on the road and how they had recognised him at the breaking of bread.

GOSPEL READING 11 (LECTIONARY GOSPEL 11)

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John [5:24-29]

Jesus said to the Jews: 'I tell you most solemnly, whoever listens to my words, and believes in the one who sent me, has eternal life; without being brought to judgement he has passed from death to life. I tell you most solemnly, the hour will come - in fact it is here already - when the dead will hear the voice of the Son of God. and all who hear it will live. For the Father, who is the source of life, has made the Son the source of life: and, because he is the Son of Man, has appointed him supreme judge. Do not be surprised at this, for the hour is coming when the dead will leave their graves at the sound of his voice; those who did good will rise again to life; and those who did evil, to condemnation. I can do nothing by myself; I can only judge as I am told to judge, and my judging is just, because my aim is to do not my own will, but the will of him who sent me.'

GOSPEL READING 12 (LECTIONARY GOSPEL 12)

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John [6:37-40]

Jesus said to the crowd: 'All that the Father gives me will come to me, and whoever comes to me
I shall not turn him away;

but to do the will of the one who sent me.
Now the will of him who sent me
is that I should lose nothing
of all that he has given to me,
and that I should raise it up on the last day.
Yes, it is my Father's will
that whoever sees the Son and believes in him
shall have eternal life,
and that I shall raise him up on the last day.'

A reading from the hold Gospel according to John [6:51–58]

Then the Jews started arguing with one another: 'How can this man give us his flesh to eat?' they said. Jesus replied:

'I tall you most colombly.

'I tell you most solemnly, if you do not

eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood.

you will not have life in you.

Anyone who does eat my flesh and drink my blood

has eternal life,

and I shall raise him up on the last day. For my flesh is real food

and my blood is real drink.

He who eats my flesh and drinks my blood lives in me

and I live in him.

As I, who am sent by the living Father, myself draw life from the Father, so whoever eats me will draw life from me. This is the bread come down from heaven; not like the bread our ancestors ate: they are dead,

but anyone who eats this bread will live for ever.'

GOSPEL READING 14 (LECTIONARY GOSPEL 14)

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John [11:17–21]

On arriving at Bethany, Jesus found that Lazarus had been in the tomb for four days already. Bethany is only about two miles from Jerusalem, and many Jews had come to Martha and Mary to sympathise with them over their brother. When Martha heard that Jesus had come she went to meet him. Mary remained sitting in the house. Martha said to Jesus, 'If you had been here, my brother would not have died, but I know that, even now, whatever you ask of God, he will grant you.' 'Your brother,' said Jesus to her, 'will rise again.' Martha said, 'I know he will rise again at the resurrection on the last day'. Jesus said:

'I am the resurrection and the life.
If anyone believes in me, even though he dies he will live,

and whoever lives and believes in me will never die.

Do you believe this?'

'Yes, Lord,' she said, 'I believe that you are the Christ, the Son of God, the one who was to come into this world.'

GOSPEL READING 15 (LECTIONARY GOSPEL 15)

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John [11:32-45]

Mary the sister of Lazarus went to Jesus, and as soon as she saw him she threw herself at his feet, saying, 'Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died.' At the sight of her tears, and those of the Jews who followed her, Jesus said in great distress, with a sigh that came straight from the heart, 'Where have you put him?' They said, 'Lord, come and see.' Jesus wept; and the Jews said, 'See how much he loved him!' But there were some who remarked, 'He opened the eyes of the blind man, could he not have prevented this man's death?' Still sighing, Jesus reached the tomb: it was a cave with a stone to close the opening. Jesus said, 'Take the stone away.' Martha said to him, 'Lord, by now he will smell; this is the fourth day." Jesus replied,

'Have I not told you that if you believe you will see the glory of God?' So they took away the stone. Then Jesus lifted up his eyes and said: 'Father, I thank you for hearing my prayer. I know indeed that you always hear me, but I speak

for the sake of all these who stand round me, so that they may believe it was you who sent me.'

When he had said this, he cried in a loud voice, 'Lazarus, here! Come out!' The dead man came out, his feet and hands bound with bands of stuff and a cloth round his face.

Jesus said to them, 'Unbind him, let him go free.'

Many of the Jews who had come to visit Mary and had seen what he did believed in him.

GOSPEL READING 16 (LECTIONARY GOSPEL 16)

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John [12:23-26]

Jesus said to his disciples:

'Now the hour has come
for the Son of Man to be glorified.
I tell you, most solemnly,
unless a wheat grain falls on the ground and
dies,
it remains only a single grain;
but if it dies,
it yields a rich harvest.
Anyone who loves his life loses it;
anyone who hates his life in this world
will keep it for the eternal life.
If a man serves me, he must follow me,
wherever I am, my servant will be there too.
If anyone serves me, my Father will honour
him.'

GOSPEL READING 18 (LECTIONARY GOSPEL 18)

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John [17:24-26]

Jesus raised his eyes to heaven and said:

I want those you have given me
to be with me where I am,

because you loved me
before the foundation of the world.

Father, Righteous One, the world has not known you, but I have known you, and these have known that you have sent me. I have made your name known to

I have made your name known to them and will continue to make it known so that the love with which you loved me may be in them, and so that I may be in them.'

GOSPEL READING 19 (LECTIONARY GOSPEL 19)

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John [19:17-18.25-30]

Carrying his own cross, Jesus went out of the city to the place of the skull or, as it was called in Hebrew, Golgotha, where they crucified him with two others, one on either side with Jesus in the middle. Near the cross of Jesus stood his mother and his mother's sister, Mary the wife of Clopas, and Mary of Magdala. Seeing his mother and the disciple he loved standing near her, Jesus said to his mother, 'Woman this is your son.' Then to the disciple he said, 'This is your mother.'

After this, Jesus knew that everything had now been completed, and to fulfil the scripture perfectly he said:

'I am thirsty.'
A jar of vinegar stood there, so putting a sponge soaked in the vinegar on a hyssop stick they held it up to his mouth. After Jesus had taken the vinegar he said, 'It is accomplished;' and bowing his head he gave

up his spirit.

It was Preparation Day, and to prevent the bodies remaining on the cross during sabbath - since that sabbath was a day of special solemnity - the Jews asked Pilate to have the legs broken and the bodies taken away. Consequently the soldiers came and broke the legs of the first man who had been crucified with him and then of the other. When they came to Jesus, they found he was already dead, and so instead of breaking his legs one of the soldiers pierced his side with a lance; and immediately there came out blood and water. This is the evidence of one who saw it - trustworthy evidence, and he knows he speaks the truth - and he gives it so that you may believe as well. Because all this happened to fulfil the words of scripture: Not one bone of his will be broken; and again, in another place scripture says: They will look on the one whom they have pierced.

After this, Joseph of Arimathaea, who was a disciple of Jesus – though a secret one because he was afraid of the Jews – asked Pilate to let him remove the body of Jesus. Pilate gave permission, so they came and took it away. Nicodemus came as well – the same one who had first come to Jesus at night-time – and he brought a mixture of myrrh and aloes, weighing about a hundred pounds.

SUGGESTED GENERAL INTERCESSIONS

The general intercessions come after the homily. In the general intercessions we pray for the deceased and his or her family and friends, for all the dead and those who mourn them, and for the needs of the wider community. Some or all of those given here may be used, or new intercessions may be composed.

Priest:

God our Father has given us victory over sin and death through his Son, Jesus Christ. Let us turn to him in our hour of need, and pray to him with confidence.

Response:

Lord, graciously hear us.

Reader

In baptism N. was given the pledge of eternal life. May he/she now be admitted to the company of the saints.

Lord, hear us.

Reader:

For N.: that Christ may have mercy on his/her soul, and grant him/her full pardon for his/her sins.

Lord, hear us.

Reader:

For the family of N.: that in these difficult and dark days they may be sustained by their faith, and by the knowledge that they will be reunited with N. one day in God's heavenly kingdom.

Lord, hear us.

Reader:

For our deceased relatives and friends: that God may bring them into the light of his presence, and give them a share in his glory. Lord, hear us.

Reader:

For all the faithful departed: that they may see God face to face in the kingdom of heaven.

Lord, hear us.

Reader:

For all here present: that our remembrance of N. may be a source of comfort and strength to us.

Lord, hear us.

Reader:

For the gift of life, which we all share and is very precious: may the Lord help us to be more aware of the gifts and talents given to us, particularly those we so often take for granted and may we use them to make the world a better place.

Reader:

Lord, hear us.

The gift of life, which we all share, is very precious. Lord, make us more aware of the gifts and talents that you have given us, particularly those that we so often take for granted. May we use them to make the world a better place.

Lord, hear us.

Reader:

For all of us gathered here: that we may remember at all times, but especially at times of trouble and anxiety, that we are loved by God and that he will take care of us.

Lord, hear us.

(Relevant prayer for death after an illness)

Reader:

We pray for all nurses and carers, particularly the nurses and carers who were so good to N. in the last months of his/her life.

Lord, hear us

Priest:

Father, into your hands we commend the soul of our brother/sister, N. Look gently upon him/her, and bring him/her home to your kingdom where death will be no more. We ask this through Christ our Lord.

AFTER THE FUNERAL

THE MEMORIAL MASS

It is traditional in many parishes to have a Memorial Mass or Month's Mind for the deceased in the weeks following the funeral.

The Month's Mind is an opportunity to commend once again the deceased to our loving God. It is celebrated in an atmosphere of prayerful remembrance, of gratitude, and of hope in the resurrection. The pain of loss is not quite as intense now, and the Memorial Mass helps us to move forward into the future.

OTHER CELEBRATIONS

In the months and years following the death of your loved one, there will be other opportunities to remember and pray for him or her in a special way.

It is good to have a Mass celebrated on the anniversary of the death, on All Soul's Day or during the month of November, and perhaps around the time of Cemetery Sunday. These will keep the memory of your loved one alive, and will help the process of grieving.
